The HEALTH-FAST Program is designed to position trainees to develop the attitudes, knowledge, and skills to conduct research on reducing health disparities associated with alcohol, tobacco, and other drug (ATOD) use. The purpose of the program is to build capacity for independent research in careers in the substance abuse sciences that specifically focus on the disproportionate burden of use and addiction in ethnic and racially minoritized populations that subsequently confer disparities in chronic diseases. The HEALTH-FAST Program is recruiting trainees who have committed to, or who are enrolled in, a full-time doctoral degree program at UH and who are committed to ATOD science with the common mission of advancing health equity.
